

# Facing the Facts


- **Fentanyl** is a synthetic opioid that's 50x more potent than heroin and 100x more potent than morphine
- 6 out of 10 fake prescription pills today contain a lethal dose of fentanyl
- These pills are being sold on social media to look like Oxycontin, Percocet, Vicodin, Xanax, and stimulants like Adderall
  - Assume every pill you purchase today **WILL KILL YOU**

U.S. Teens Age 14-18






# Fentanyl's Growth, Multi-substance, Youth Impact Trends

Multiple drugs may be involved in one drug death. Death rates are per 100K population.






## Trends



- 82% of all opioid-involved deaths in 2020 - FENTANYL.
- In 2022, 110,315 deaths
- FENTANYL is slaughtering an entire generation...


## Fentanyl overdoses become No. 1 cause of death among US adults, ages 18-45: 'A national emergency'

More adults between 18 and 45 died of fentanyl overdoses in 2020 than COVID-19, motor vehicle accidents, cancer and suicide



# Naloxone

- **Life saving** medication that reverses the effects of an opioid overdose
- Should be kept in every household like a first aid kit or an EpiPen
- Use if signs of an overdose...
  - Small, constricted “**pinpoint pupils**”
  - Falling asleep or **losing consciousness**
  - Slow, weak, or **no breathing**
  - Choking or gurgling sounds
  - Limp body
  - **Cold** and/or clammy skin
  - Discolored **blue** skin (especially in lips and nails)
- Safe for all ages and NO contraindications for use
- Ask a pharmacist, non-profit, or Fentanyl Fathers to get Naloxone for your home

# Good Samaritan Law

- Prevents drug possession charges against those that seek medical assistance for an overdose.
- This law makes saving lives the priority during a drug overdose, not criminal prosecutions of illegal drug users
- SAVING A LIFE is more important than SAVING A FRIENDSHIP
  - If you see something SAY SOMETHING



## What to do if you think someone is overdosing

It may be hard to tell whether a person is high or experiencing an overdose. If you aren't sure, treat it like an overdose—you could save a life.

- 1** Call 911 Immediately.\*
- 2** Administer naloxone, if available.
- 3** Try to keep the person awake and breathing.
- 4** Lay the person on their side to prevent choking.
- 5** Stay with the person until emergency assistance arrives.

*\*Most states have laws that may protect a person who is overdosing or the person who called for help from legal trouble.*
